READY for READING

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Who needs reading support and why?

- Nearly 2/3 of college students are underprepared in some way, per 2016 report by <u>Center for Community College Student</u>
 Engagement/U of Austin
- As the principles of <u>Universal</u>

 <u>Design for Learning</u> tell us, "What helps one, helps all"

- Not all college reading is the same
 - Textbooks
 - Trade books
 - Scholarly books and articles
 - Web articles/Web sites
 - Magazines, newspapers
- Comprehension skills and Vocabulary

Reading/Writing Connection

- Main Idea (Topic Sentence, Key Point) = Thesis (Thesis statement, Topic)
 - Topic Sentence/Supporting Details (Sources, evidence, examples, etc.)
- Organizational Patterns (Methods of Development) and more Org. Patterns
- POV, Bias, Fact/Opinion, Purpose, Tone
- <u>Inference</u>, <u>Figurative Language</u>, <u>F/O, Bias, POV</u> (writer implies/reader infers)
- Purpose, Tone & Audience

Do we have to teach them everything?

1. Be explicit in your assignments

2. Model how to think and how to read

Be Explicit and Model

(Reading Process, Writing Process & Critical Thinking)

- Think Aloud Strategy
- Navigate a Textbook
- Annotate, Take Notes, Highlight
- Summarize, Paraphrase & Reflection
- Connect text-to-self, text-to-text, text-to-world

- Gather Sources
- Evaluate Sources
- Annotate Sources
- Use sources in-text
- Cite Sources (in-text and in Works Cited)

Basics for Each New Reading

- Find a distraction-free place, no text messages or social media
- Before you read: Preview the text

Look at the title, author, headings, paragraphs, vocabulary, and any other clues, list what you learned about each.

Recognize prior knowledge

What do you already know about the text's topic? Write one paragraph.

• Next: Scan for new vocabulary

When you look through the text for unfamiliar words, what words do you find? List and define 5 words as they are used in the text.

• While reading: Highlight and annotate

Highlight, make notes and annotate the text. Write a one-paragraph summary.

After reading: Free write

Write a personal response to what you read. Can you make any real-life connections?

Free write should be one paragraph, 200 words, minimum.
