# WORD PARTS

- Sometimes long words contain smaller words or word parts
- Prefixes, Roots, Suffixes
  - Some words have all 3, some do not
- Latin & Greek word parts are building blocks for English words
- Learning word parts will help to increase your vocabulary

### PREFIXES

• Prefixes come at the beginning of a word.

### **Latin Examples:**

• a (or ab): without or not

• anti: against

• dis: not

• in (il, im, ir): in or out

• ex (e): out or out of

**Greek Examples:** 

hyper: over

• mono: one

• tele: far/distance

amoral, abnormal

antifreeze

disagree, disengage

inspect, illegal

export, eject

hyperactive

monotone

telescope, telephone

# ROOTS

• The root of a word gives its core meaning and can be at the beginning, middle or end of a word.

### **Latin Examples:**

cide: kill (always end of word) insecticide

cred: belief credible

dict: word, say dictionary, predict

#### **Greek Examples:**

auto: self autobiography,

bio: life biology, biography

psych (psycho) mind psychology, psychic

### SUFFIXES

• Suffixes, which come at the end of a word, tell you how the word is used—whether it is a noun, verb, adjective, or adverb.

### Example Suffix for Noun(s)

-ist (person) dentist, realist

-ion (quality/condition) action, tension

### Example of Suffix for Verb

-ify justify, simplify

### **Examples of Suffix for Adjective**

-able/ible stretchable, sensible

# EXAMPLE OF USING WORD PARTS TO BUILD VOCABULARY:

- The suffix –*cide* means *kill*. I can understand many words by knowing/learning what –*cide* means.
  - Insecticide
  - Homocide
  - Suicide

If I don't completely understand the meaning of the whole word, I can at least know part of it and then try to figure out the rest by using **context clues** (how the word is used in its sentence and/or paragraph).

# Another way to Build Vocabulary is by understanding **ALTERNATE forms** words.

- Alternate means different, but similar.
- Example: Sympathetic
  - Sympathetically
  - Sympathies
  - Sympathize
  - Sympathy

oMy sister's cat died and I sympathize with her. I sent her a sympathy card. I deal with her sympathetically, by expressing my sympathies. I am sympathetic toward her.

# HOW TO FIND WORDS THAT ARE RELATED BY WORD PARTS:

- Hard copy dictionaries often give some related words when there is a common root.
- <u>www.dictionary.com</u> has lists of "related words" in the left column for any given word.
- Search for related words on the internet by typing in a word or word part.
