Microaggressions	Examples
Microassaults	<ul> <li>"You don't belong here. Go back home!"</li> <li>A person of color being followed in the store.</li> <li>Barring a person from entry into an event based on their assumed group membership.</li> <li>Racial profiling by law enforcement.</li> <li>Restricting a person's freedom of movement on campus based on their assumed group membership.</li> </ul>
Microinsults	<ul> <li>Assuming the Black, Latinx, and Native American students are probably not prepared for college.</li> <li>"You're so articulate!" (to a Black student (or faculty/staff))</li> <li>"You're different, not like most people."</li> <li>"You don't seem gay."</li> <li>"You have great fashion sense for a plus-sized girl."</li> <li>White woman moving away and clutching her purse when a</li> <li>Black man joins her in an elevator.</li> <li>"You look like a girl!" (to a Native American boy/man with long hair)</li> <li>"Where are you from? You're so interesting-looking."</li> </ul>
Microinvalidations	<ul> <li>"You won't succeed here. This is not the place for you."</li> <li>"When I look at you, I don't see color."</li> <li>"It must have been easy for you to get into the grad program because you're Black."</li> <li>"As a woman, I know what it's like to be in a minority group."</li> <li>"You're an outsider. You don't count."</li> <li>"How did <i>you</i> get this job?"</li> <li>Repeatedly using the wrong pronouns for a transgender person.</li> </ul>
